Principal's Report Cont... Child Safe Standards

This is the first in a series of the "short guide" to the new Child Safe Standards. We will be including all eleven standards in the newsletters over the next 12 weeks.




Standard 1

Organisations establish a culturally safe environment in which the diverse and unique identities and experiences of Aboriginal children and young people are respected and valued

In complying with Child Safe Standard 1 an organisation must, at a minimum, ensure:

- 1.1 A child's ability to express their culture and enjoy their cultural rights is encouraged and actively supported.
- 1.2 Strategies are embedded within the organisation which equip all members to acknowledge and appreciate the strengths of Aboriginal culture and understand its importance to the wellbeing and safety of Aboriginal children and young people.
- 1.3 Measures are adopted by the organisation to ensure racism within the organisation is identified, confronted and not tolerated. Any instances of racism are addressed with appropriate consequences.
- 1.4 The organisation actively supports and facilitates participation and inclusion within it by Aboriginal children, young people and their families.
- 1.5 All of the organisation's policies, procedures, systems and processes together create a culturally safe and inclusive environment and meet the needs of Aboriginal children, young people and their families.







Standard 2

Child safety and wellbeing is embedded in organisational leadership, governance and culture

In complying with Child Safe Standard 2 an organisation must, at a minimum, ensure:

- 2.1 The organisation makes a public commitment to child safety.
- 2.2 A child safe culture is championed and modelled at all levels of the organisation from the top down and bottom up.
- 2.3 Governance arrangements facilitate implementation of the Child Safety and Wellbeing Policy at all levels.
- 2.4 A Code of Conduct provides guidelines for staff and volunteers on expected behavioural standards and responsibilities.
- 2.5 Risk management strategies focus on preventing, identifying and mitigating risks to children and young people.
- 2.6 Staff and volunteers understand their obligations on information sharing and record keeping.

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Child Safety

5D.3 Policy

Rationale:

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- Ministerial Order No. 870 "Child Safe Standards Managing the risk of child abuse in schools" outlines a set of minimum child safety standards which Coburg Special Developmental School (Coburg SDS) adopts in its commitment to zero tolerance of child abuse. Child abuse, in its broadest form, includes:
 - any act committed against a child involving
 - a sexual offence; or
 - an offence under section 49B(2) of the Crimes Act 1958 (grooming) and
 - the infliction, on a child, of
 - physical violence; or
 - serious emotional or psychological harm; and
 - serious neglect of a child
- This policy applies to all school environments provided by Coburg SDS for a child's use including online and external locations and upholds the edict that all children have a right to be safe and free from abuse.

Aims:

- Coburg SDS embeds and engenders a culture of child safety and the fact that it is everyone's
 responsibility to keep all children safe and free from abuse. The school's governing authority will
 lead this commitment to zero tolerance of child abuse and mandate all staff (including
 contractors and volunteers), visitors and children to proactively ensure the safety of children at
 all times.
- Coburg SDS is committed to the safety of all children including those with a disability, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children, children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds and vulnerable children.
- Coburg SDS community has shared values of Building Independence, Building Relationships and Building Communication underpinning our Safety Code of Conduct.
- Coburg SDS upholds the Communication Bill of Rights for all students. Staff explicitly teach students how to refuse or reject, as well as how to ask for help; amongst other skills.
- Coburg SDS has aligned its practices with the Child Safety Standards as written in Ministerial Order No. 870, and has developed:
 - 1. strategies to embed an organisational culture of child safety, including through effective leadership arrangements
 - 2. a child safe policy or statement of commitment to child safety
 - 3. a code of conduct that establishes clear expectations for appropriate behaviour with children
 - 4. screening, supervision, training and other human resources practices that reduce the risk of child abuse by new and existing personnel
 - 5. processes for responding to and reporting suspected child abuse
 - 6. strategies to identify and reduce or remove risks of child abuse
 - 7. strategies to promote the participation and empowerment of children

Implementation:

Coburg SDS will:

- Advertise widely, and in a variety of ways, its Child Safety Policy, Child Safety Code of Conduct and the expectation that we are all working toward zero tolerance of child abuse
- Develop slogans and messages that can be visible on the website, Newsletter, on posters etc in regard to the school's (and its community's) commitment to child safety
- Assign specific roles within its staff Roles and Responsibilities structure to ensure continued compliance with the Standards:
 - Child Safety Officer: Warren Tofts
- Align all relevant school policies, in regard to student welfare and wellbeing, with the Child Safety Policy; which include:
 - Student Engagement Policy
 - Student Anti Bullying Policy
 - Visitors to School Policy
 - Volunteers and Privacy in the School Community Policy
 - o Volunteers Policy
 - o Yard Duty Policy
 - o Publication of Student Work and Photographs Policy
 - o Mandatory Reporting Policy
- Review risk management procedures to ensure safety of all children in any activity provided by the school
- Align recruitment and HR practices to ensure all jobs involving child-connected work clearly state the job's requirements, duties and responsibilities regarding child safety and informing all applicants of these
- Tighten procedures in terms of the use of volunteers and contractors; ensuring they are aware of the school's culture of child safety, outlining their responsibilities in this regard, whilst ascertaining their commitment toward this goal
- Follow all protocols and procedures in regard to mandatory reporting as outlined in Coburg SDS Mandatory Reporting Policy and Child Safety Responding and Reporting Obligations Policy and Procedures
- Build a culture of support and encouragement when discussing child safety matters and have a clear process for working through these issues

Evaluation:

• This policy will be reviewed annually to ensure compliance with the Child Safe Standards

Smile Squad

General Information

The friendly Smile Squad dental team will provide Victorian public primary and secondary school students with a free, high quality annual dental health examination and free follow up treatment as needed.

What is included?

At the first appointment (the check-up), Smile Squad will check your child's teeth.

Then, depending on your child's needs, services may include:

- x-rays
- fluoride varnish
- scale and clean
- fissure sealants
- a free dental pack: a toothbrush, toothpaste and information
- advice about dental health and diet

If a child needs more treatment, like a filling, Smile Squad will contact parents/guardians and make a second appointment. These extra treatments are also **completely free**.

The program does not include cosmetic procedures.

What will Smile Squad do?

First, Smile Squad will visit your child's school to check your child's teeth and provide preventive care. This takes about 15 minutes.

If your child doesn't need any extra treatment, Smile Squad will see your child again in 12 months.

If your child needs extra treatment, Smile Squad will send home an individual care plan for you to read. Then, Smile Squad will call you to talk about what your child needs and ask for your consent to the extra treatment. Smile Squad will make a new appointment for your child for the treatment. Usually, this appointment will also be at the school. This treatment is also free.

Students will also receive a free dental pack and education on teeth brushing and healthy eating.

You may also visit <u>www.dhsv.org.au</u> if you require any further information.

To keep your teeth strong and healthy, eat well, drink tap water, and brush twice a day with fluoride toothpaste.

Is your child turning 16? Call Centrelink at least 3 months before to get the paperwork for the Pension. Make sure your child has a TAX file number (from the age of 5 years old).

- Is your child in nappies or pull-ups? Make sure you include it in your NDIS plan.
 - \Rightarrow Taxi Doctor submits it online.
- Forms are available from the office:
 - ⇒ Companion Card → We Care → Disability Parking Permit etc

NDIS - When your child turns 18 years old, you will need a <u>Plan Nominee Form</u> (available from the NDIS office) to speak on your child's behalf.
